The fall event attracted 105 attendees and was evaluated highly with an overall score of 4.26 on a 5-point scale. General sessions included: Leading Change: Opportunities and Challenges; Building Your Academic Leadership Team; Return on Investment: Getting Results; Developing our Next Generation of Leaders; Tabletop Discussions – Leading Change: Building Academic Leadership Teams; and Building Your Team beyond Your School. Optimizing Strategies for Success

This annual conference is devoted to issues of particular interest to baccalaureate and prelicensure nursing educators. The general sessions included: Lessons Learned: Optimizing Civil Learning Environments; National Council of State Boards of Nursing Update; Tabletop Discussions: Successful Strategies for Improving First-Time Test-Taker NCLEX-RN Pass Rates; The Law and the Nurse Educator; and Creating a Balanced Work Life. Group discussions, poster sessions, and abstract presentations encouraged participants to clarify issues and share successful approaches. A record number of 591 educators attended the conference and gave it an overall score of 4.29 on a 5-point scale. This annual conference brings together deans, associate deans for research, directors of doctoral programs, and other faculty to chart the future of doctoral nursing education. The general/breakout sessions included: Data Science and the Nursing Doctorate; AACN Updates; Big Data Analytics for Healthcare; Integrating Data Science Concepts and Methods into the PhD Curriculum; Implementation of the DNP Task Force: Recommendations; Enhancing Nursing Science and Improving Patient Care; and PhD-DNP Collaborative Studies. Participants were also encouraged to explore personal interests through concurrent sessions (categorized on the agenda as research, practice, or both), breakfast gatherings, and abstract and poster presentations. Over 710 participated and they evaluated the conference favorably, with an overall score of 4.06 on a 5-point scale. The Nursing Science and the Research-Focused Doctorate Pre-Conference Workshop, the Faculty Practice Pre-Conference, and the Research Leadership Network (RLN) Meeting took place in conjunction with this main event.
