This popular series is designed for new and aspiring academic leaders as well as for experienced faculty members who want to improve their leadership skills for a variety of positions within the nursing academic unit. The same program precedes both the Baccalaureate Education Conference and the Spring Annual Meeting. The fall event attracted 100 attendees and was evaluated highly with an overall score of 4.65 on a 5-point scale. General sessions included: Setting the Stage for Success; The Art and Science of Financial Management in Nursing Programs; Welcome to Leadership from Your New Friend, Your Attorney: A Discussion of Faculty and Student Legal Issues; Negotiating at an Uneven Table; Setting the Stage for Success: Tabletop Discussions; and Branding and Imaging for Academic and Leadership Roles. The same program is offered this month (to deans only) prior to the Spring Annual Meeting. As of March 5th, 88 participants have preregistered for the spring version of EDS.

Professional Competency: Putting the Pieces Together

November 20-22, 2014, Renaissance Baltimore Harborplace, Baltimore, MD

This annual conference is devoted to issues of particular interest to baccalaureate and prelicensure nursing educators. The general sessions included: Revolutionizing Nursing Education through New Curriculum Models, Driving Forces, and Digital Initiatives; Outcome Competency Assessment: Lessons Learned from Physical Therapy; National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Update; and Clinical Evaluation: Verifying Competency. Group discussions, poster sessions, and abstract presentations encouraged participants to clarify issues and share successful approaches. A record number of 580 educators attended the conference and gave it an overall score of 4.45 on a 5-point scale. The National Nursing Informatics Deep Dive Pre-Conference and the Instructional Leadership Network (ILN) Meeting took place in conjunction with this main event.

The Synergy of Scholarship: Research and Practice

January 29-31, 2015, Hotel Del Coronado, San Diego, CA

This annual conference brings together deans, associate deans for research, directors of doctoral programs, and other faculty to chart the future of doctoral nursing education. The general/breakout sessions included: Synergy for Research and Practice; AACN Updates: Issues, Outcomes, Challenges, and Future Directions; Getting Funded: What Makes Your Grant Competitive?; Open Forum with the DNP Implementation Task Force; Evaluating Innovations in Nursing Education: Findings from Five Studies on Doctoral Education in Nursing; and Through a Glass, Darkly: Nursing, Big Data, and Creating Knowledge for the Future of Health. Participants were also encouraged to explore personal interests through concurrent sessions (categorized on the agenda as research, practice, or both), breakfast gatherings, and abstract and poster presentations. Over 697 participated, with attendance hampered by major snowstorms on the East Coast. Participants evaluated the conference favorably, with an overall score of 4.18 on a 5-point scale. Furthermore, 80% of the researched-focused faculty and 91% of the practicedfocused faculty felt the conference met their needs. The Nursing Science and the Research-Focused Doctorate Pre-Conference Workshop, the Faculty Practice Pre-Conference, and the Research Leadership Network (RLN) Meeting took place in conjunction with this main event. This annual conference is aimed at those new to the faculty role and those who want to gain more self-confidence in teaching in baccalaureate and higher degree programs. In addition to five plenary topics – Transforming Nursing Education; Optimizing the Learning Environment; Enhancing the Academic Work Environment: Focus on the Faculty; Trends and Legal Issues Confronting Nursing Faculty: The Discussion Continues; and Nuts and Bolts for Success in the Faculty Role: Stocking Your Professional Toolkit – attendees selected three concurrent topics from a slate of 12, all offering pragmatic guidance on specifics of classroom and clinical teaching. Future Perspectives for Master's Nursing Education

This annual conference addresses issues and concerns of master's programs focused on direct care roles (e.g., CNLs and nurse educators) and indirect care roles (e.g., public health nurses, informaticists, clinical research coordinators, and nurse administrators or managers). General sessions included: The Present State of Master's Education in Nursing; Forward Focused: Opportunities and Imperatives for Master's Prepared Nurses; Why We Need Well-Educated Nurses to Lead the Transformation of Health Care; The DNP by 2015: Findings from the RAND Study on Facilitators and Barriers to the Doctor of Nursing Practice; and Institute of Medicine Update: Where Are We Now? Where Should We Be Going? Multiple opportunities existed for participants to discuss mutual concerns, offer successful strategies, and share successes via discussions, posters, and abstract presentations. Over 319 participants attended and evaluations are in progress.
