Following a new forecast on the growth of the RN workforce over the next 10 years, this talk will discuss 5 examples of the hidden costs of failing to educate nurses and researchers about healthcare economics, financing, and payment policies, including the need to finance nurses' effort to address social determinants of health, the high and self-inflicted costs of mandating patient-to-nurse staffing ratios, the ill-thought out idea of direct reimbursement for nurses, the economics of travel nurses during COVID, and the inability of nurses to recognize and act on the opportunities presented by value-based payment. This insightful presentation will conclude with new ideas on how to approach educating nurses in the future.
