Development of Novel Teaching Modules to Improve Writing Skills in RN to BSN Programs

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Abstract

Background/Introduction

Scholarly writing in RN-BSN education is an essential curricular component yet is often identified as a significant barrier to student success. As a result, student stress and challenges with written communication can hinder their success in the program. To address this issue, nursing faculty need to design courses that accommodate the needs of students and provide effective writing resources.

Purpose

The purpose of this project was to develop innovative teaching modules to increase course pass rates of students enrolled in RN to BSN writing intensive courses.

Methods or Processes/Procedures

A committee was formed consisting of four core faculty that led writing intensive courses. The committee met monthly from 2021 to 2022. To achieve the project goals, existing writing resources were reviewed, and new resources were developed. Modules addressed consistent barriers to student writing success which included: searching the literature, writing structure, plagiarism, APA, outline, introductory paragraph, and tips for writing success. These resources were then integrated into all RN to BSN writing courses. Program evaluation was completed with the core writing faculty.

Results

Data on the project's outcomes were collected and analyzed. Prior to implementation of this program, in the Spring semester of 2021 86.5% (n=74) received a grade of 73% or higher. After implementation of the writing intensive modules, Spring of 2022 92% (n=88) received a passing grade of 73% or higher. Core faculty members teaching in the writing intensive courses observed a favorable trend.

Limitations

This project was implemented in a single university setting over one academic year potentially limiting the generalization of findings.

Conclusions/Implications for Practice

Development of a targeted writing initiative can improve success of RN to BSN students in writing intensive courses.
