INTRODUCTION

Maternal mortality rates are alarmingly high, especially for Black women.

- AWHONN's Framework: Focuses on dignity, privacy, and equitable care
- Collaborative Approach: Interprofessional collaboration to improve outcomes
- Impactful Change: Transforming maternity care to save lives

UGLY TRUTH



Black women are 3-5 x more likely to die from pregnancy-related causes than White women

Racism, mistreatment, disrespect, and abuse = poorer childbirth outcomes and experiences

Black mothers report feeling unheard during maternity care = negative health outcomes


BACKGROUND
