Nurse Home Visitors (NHVs) conduct home visits with first-time, low-income expectant mothers every two weeks, or according to client need, from pregnancy until the child's second birthday. NHVs complete physical, social, environmental, home, family history, intimate partner violence, and mental health assessments at home visits. NHVs provide mothers with education and resources related to pregnancy, labor and delivery, and other resources as needed by the individualized family need. Certified lactation counselor (CLC) provides a breastfeeding consultation with mothers through a 2-hour individual breastfeeding workshop.
