Dear Speaker Johnson, Leader Thune, Leader Jeffries, and Leader Schumer,

The American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) appreciates the work of Congress and the House and Senate Appropriations Committees for putting forward a conferenced Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies (LHHS-ED) bill that includes **\$305.472 million for the Title VIII Nursing Workforce Development Programs (Title VIII of the Public Health Service Act [42 U.S.C. 296 et seq.]) and \$197.693 million for the National Institute of Nursing Research (NINR)**. As the national voice for academic nursing, AACN represents more than 875 schools of nursing at public and private universities, who educate more than 540,000 students and employ more than 53,500 faculty.¹ Collectively, these institutions graduate registered nurses (RNs), advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs), educators, researchers, scientists, and frontline providers. In order for our schools to support our current and future nursing workforce, federal investment in nursing education is vital. **Therefore, we urge Congress to pass this minibuss package before the January 30 deadline.**

To meet the heightened need for nurses, robust federal investments in nursing education and workforce development are paramount. Title VIII Nursing Workforce Development Programs strengthen nursing education at all levels, from entry-level preparation through graduate study. Through grants, scholarships, and loan repayment opportunities, these vital federal investments positively impact the profession's ability to serve America's patients across the country. In fact, Title VIII Programs strengthen nursing education and practice, support pathways into the profession and career advancement for nurses, expand the nursing workforce, and serve rural and underserved communities.


AACN also recognizes that scientific research and discovery are the foundation on which nursing practice is built and is essential to advancing evidence-based interventions, informing policy and state-of-the-art education, and ultimately sustaining the health of the nation. As one of the 27 Institutes and Centers at NIH, NINR is integral to improving care and is on the cutting edge of new innovations that impact how nurses are educated and how they practice. Nurse scientists and


