Dear Senator Durbin and Congresswoman Bonamici:

On behalf of the 55 undersigned organizations representing the Nursing Community Coalition (NCC), we would like to thank you for introducing the Nurse Faculty Shortage Reduction Act (S.3707/H.R.7279). The NCC is a cross section of education, practice, research, and regulation within the nursing profession representing Registered Nurses (RNs), Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs),¹ nurse leaders, boards of nursing, students, faculty, and researchers. Together, we urge Congress to include the bipartisan Nurse Faculty Shortage Reduction Act in any health care or workforce package and pass this legislation before the end of the year.

In the National Advisory Council on Nurse Education and Practice (NACNEP) 19th Annual Report, "Mitigating Nursing Workforce Challenges and Optimizing Learning Environments," NACNEP recognized the nurse faculty shortage as one of four immediate needs for federal investment and suggested that steps need to be taken, "to close the salary gap between nurse faculty and similarly-credentialed advanced practice nurse clinicians to attract more educators and strengthen nursing education, research, and scholarship."² Further, the American Association of Colleges of Nursing reported that the most critical issue to faculty recruitment is noncompetitive salaries.³ The Nurse Faculty Shortage Reduction Act would help address this issue by providing much needed grant funding to close the pay gap and support our faculty so they can help educate our future nursing workforce. As one of the primary barriers to accepting qualified nursing students⁴, addressing the nurse faculty shortage is imperative.

The NCC appreciates your leadership on this issue and ardent support for our current and future nursing workforce. We look forward to working to advance the bipartisan Nurse Faculty
