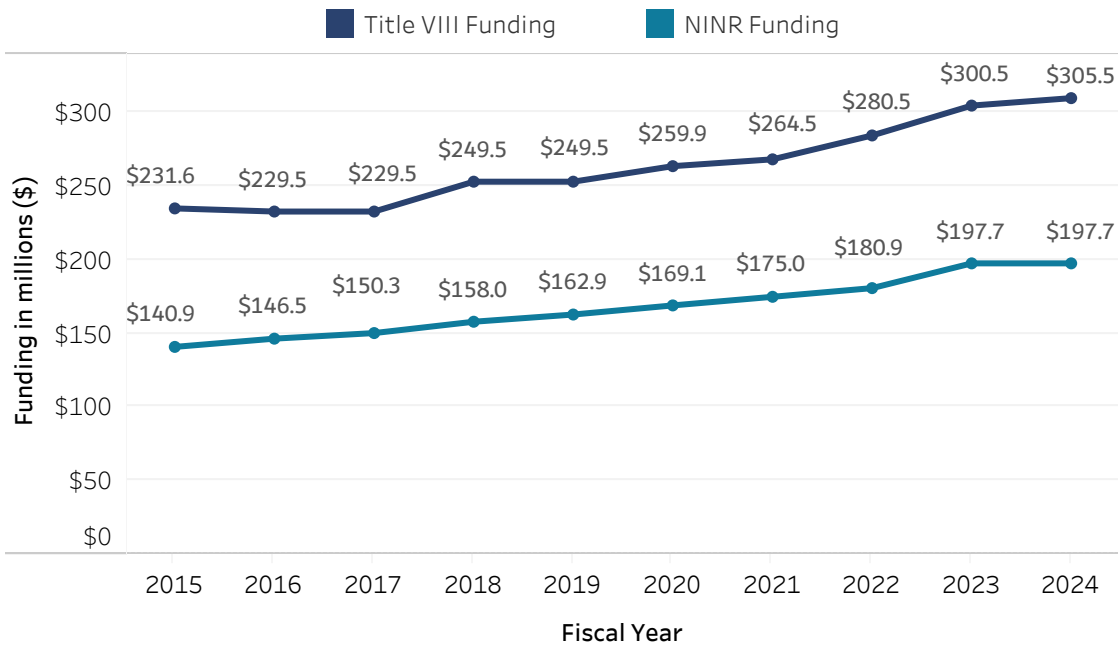

0.3% increase in enrollment in BSN programs (825) students from 2022 to 2023.



0.9% decrease in enrollment in master's programs (1,176 fewer students) in 2023, marking the third year of decline.



3.1% decrease in enrollment in PhD programs (137 students) from 2022 to 2023.

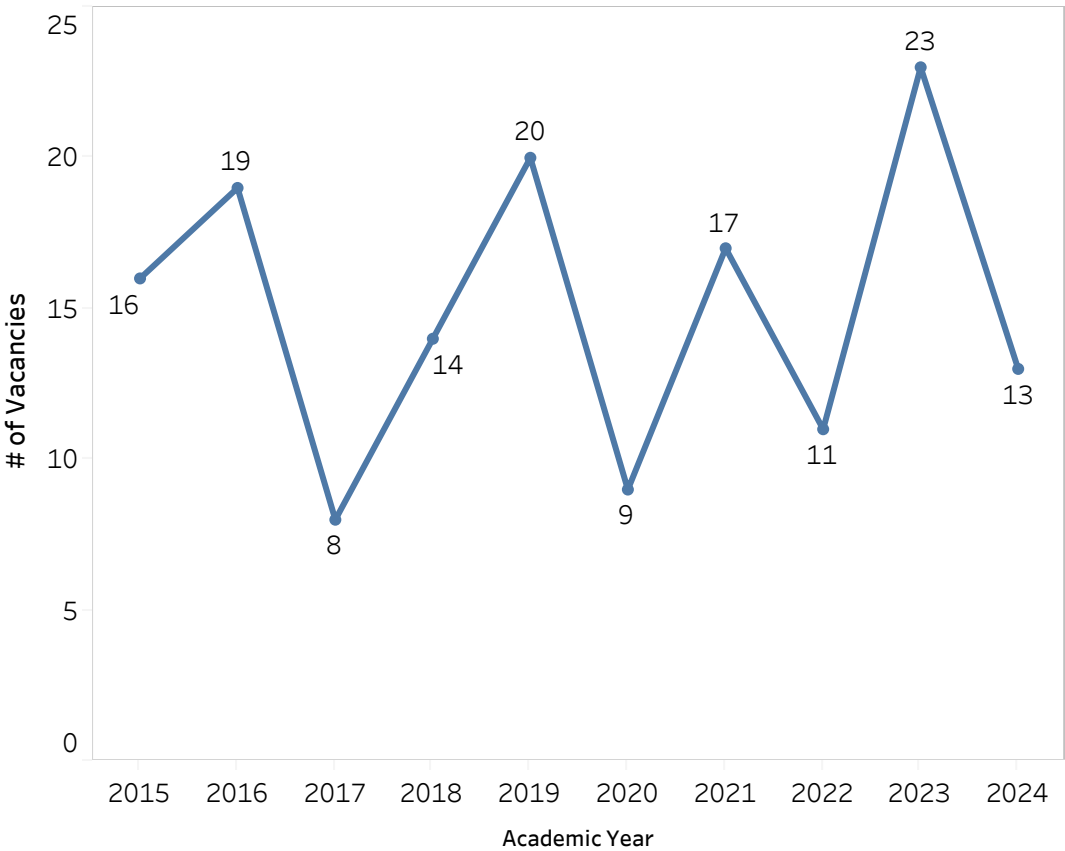


2.0% increase in enrollment in Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) programs (810 students) from 2022 to 2023.

UNDERSTANDING THE FACULTY SHORTAGE³

Faculty shortage is an obstacle to expanding the nation's nursing workforce and meeting health care demands. Budget constraints, an aging faculty, and increasing job competition from clinical sites are a few examples that contribute to this crisis. This data provides an overview of the scope of the nursing faculty shortage at the state level.
