Dorothy E. Forde, MSN, RNC-NIC, CNS, is a third year PhD student at the University of San Diego (USD) and 2016 recipient of the Doris A. Howell Foundation Research Award. She completed her BSN and MSN at Loma Linda University. Dorothy worked as a former US Consulate Nurse in the Congo, and in 2010, was sent on a joint collaboration by USAID/Loma Linda University with the Palestinian Health Sector Reform and Development Project (Flagship Project) to upgrade the standards of 2 hospitals in Palestine. Her doctoral dissertation and research is focused on kangaroo mother care (KC) as an intervention that conserves energy for growth, healing, and maturation of premature infants. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International (STTI) and served as former president of STTI - Gamma Alpha chapter.

Tamryn Fowler Gray, MSN, BMTCN, CNL, RN, is a second-year PhD student and Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Future of Nursing Scholar at Johns Hopkins University. Her dissertation focuses on implications for clinical trial participation and cancer disparities.
