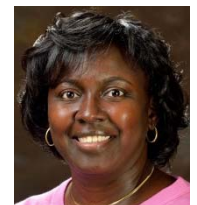


Johnson & Johnson Campaign for Nursing's Future – AACN Fall 2017 Minority Nurse Faculty Scholars



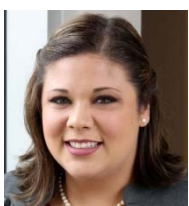
