

Presentations provided to School Boards, relevant school administrators and school nurses.</li> <li>Quarterly Schools/Environment Committee meetings with meaningful discussions related to expanding partnership with multiple sites across LI.</li> <li>Local LI asthma burden collectively shared among all partners.</li> <li>a. Issues of 'territoriality' or 'turf wars' were avoided in transparent discussions.</li> <li>b. Ownership of the Long Island based childhood asthma burden challenge became collectively shared by the partnership, as the scope of the problem was more fully understood.</li> <li>c. <ul> <li>Knowledge is shared among partners with a commitment to:</li> <li>Share current best practices</li> <li>Support national certification, accreditation, and regulatory reviews</li> <li>Support interprofessional education and joint research</li> <li>Integrate interprofessional competencies</li> </ul> Commitment by academic and community practice partners to maximize potential of each individual partner as well as collective partnership.	<ul> <li>As best practices in nursing education were shared across member nursing faculty from three colleges, qualitative collaborative work began to investigate benefits of APP related to nursing students' perception of working in this novel model.</li> <li>Quantitative research was proposed to investigate the efficacy of OAS in our suburban LI communities, using existing data that was never analyzed for purpose.</li> <li>In 2017, the APP dubbed themselves, <i>The Dream Team</i>, because of the following characteristics: (a) unwavering culture of trust and respect; (b) shared responsibility to provide nursing student a perspective on health disparities across LI, related to asthma ED visits and hospitalizations; (c) shared innovation; (d) shared decision making related to model's strategic plan; (e) consideration of shared research and presentation responsibilities; (f) leveraging of shared cross-sector competencies; (g) support of interprofessional education and joint research endeavors; (h) ACLI support of faculty pursuing national certification in asthma education; and (i) absence of 'turf wars' with clinical sites.</li> <li>Our mantra became, "<i>our reach exceeds our touch</i>," reflected in the numerous linkages created as a result of our work.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>As a result of this sustainable multi-sector APP, the following outcomes have been achieved: <ul> <li>15 professional refereed local and national presentations including New York State Public Health Association, Association of Community Health Nurse Educators, American Academy of Pediatrics, Association of Asthma Educators, American College of Chest Physicians, Sigma Theta Tau and American Public Health Association.</li> <li>10 invited presentations including Centers for Disease Control (site visits) NYSDOH, and regional ALA key stakeholders.</li> <li>5 refereed local and national poster presentations</li> <li>14 media interviews, online media press releases and articles</li> <li>Multiple invited presentations to regional and local school nurse association conferences</li> <li>Multiple meetings with local legislators discussing the high asthma burden in their constituent communities.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
